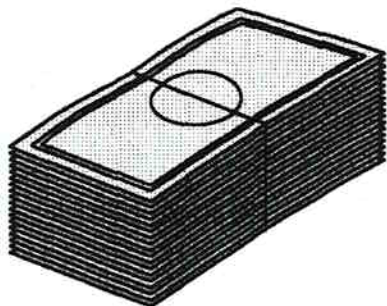

63 2dr Sedan - 4 inch chop out of roof, lowered 2 inches, 6 cyl, 2 spd automatic transmission.

64 Convertible - (Paul Seitz's car), 302 V8, 4 spd, 3.55 posi 8" rear, granada discs, lowered 2 inches, 16 x 8 rear & 16 x 7 front wheels, custom dash, smoothed engine compartment with all wiring and brake line hidden, removable monte carlo and export brace, flush fit gas door with redone fill tube to fix filling kickback problem, custom 2 1/2 exhaust that exits thru cutouts in rear bumper.

62 2dr Wagon - "Done Rat Rod Style" with satin black paint and white top with scallops, air bag suspension, 6 cyl, C-4 automatic transmission.

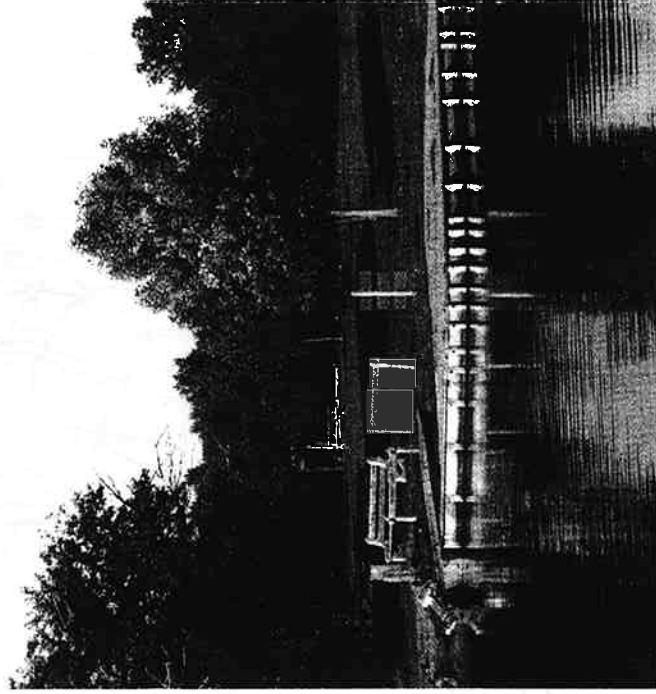
- * Decisions were made by going "eeny-meeny-miney-mo."

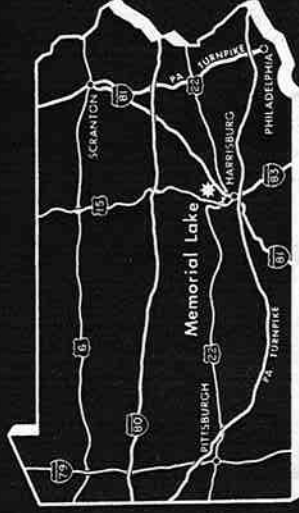

MEMORIAL LAKE STATE PARK

Memorial Lake State Park is surrounded by Fort Indiantown Gap Military Reservation in East Hanover Township. The park consists of 230 acres in scenic Lebanon County near the southern base of Blue Mountain.

The park is located 30 minutes east of Harrisburg and is accessible from Interstate 81 at Exit 29 (Fort Indiantown Gap), take Pennsylvania Route 934 North and follow the signs to the park.

RECREATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES

An 85-acre lake is the main focal point of the park. The park is open year-round and has facilities for picnicking, boating, fishing, hiking, ice skating, ice fishing, and cross-country skiing.

Boating: Non-powered boats and boats with electric motors are permitted. Non-powered boats must display one of the following: 1) State Park launch permit, 2) State Park mooring permit or 3) a current Pennsylvania boat registration.

Motorized boats must display a current registration. Boats registered in other states must display a Pennsylvania State Park launch permit in addition to their current registration. Personal Flotation Devices must be available or worn in all boats.

Two boat launching ramps are available with a courtesy dock located at the main boating area. There are 56 overnight mooring spaces available on a first-come, first-served basis. Sailboating and sailboarding are very popular on Memorial Lake, and ample space is provided in nearby parking lots for vehicle and boat trailer parking. There is a boat concession in operation from Memorial Day through Labor Day with canoes, paddleboats, rowboats, sailboats and sailboards available for rent.

Fishing: Largemouth bass, muskellunge, northern pike, yellow perch, white and black crappie, various species of panfish, bullheads, channel catfish, carp and suckers are available for the angler. Trout are also found in the lake although they are not stocked in Memorial Lake. The lake is readily accessible for shoreline or boat fishing.

Hiking: A short woodland trail winds along the northern shoreline. The open nature of the park allows the visitor to take casual walks through most of the park. Scenic views of the lake provide a tranquil setting, especially during the spring and autumn days. Birdwatchers have the opportunity to observe over 100 different species of wildlife in the park.

Picnicking: Four separate access roads provide easy entry to the day-use areas. Picnic tables are provided in shady groves, along the shoreline, and at areas which provide scenic views of the lake. Two picnic pavilions are available for reservation or on a first-come, first-served basis. They are conveniently located with easy access to the lake, restrooms and water fountains. Each pavilion accommodates 70 people. Charcoal grills are conveniently located throughout the park.

Playfields are available near the picnic areas for softball, volleyball, and other game sports. Two play areas are also available. A one-mile exercise course is located in the eastern portion of the park. The 20 station course begins and ends near the main parking lot along the northern shore of the lake.

Cross-Country Skiing: Memorial Lake State Park provides an excellent opportunity for short distance cross-country ski trips for the novice and experienced skier. The easy rolling terrain and open nature of the park lends itself to excellent family or group recreation.

Ice Fishing: The lake is open for ice fishing except for a one-acre area near the main boat launch which is maintained for ice skating. Muskellunge, northern pike, perch and catfish are available to ice anglers.

Help Protect and Preserve Our Parks

The Department of Conservation and Natural Resources, Bureau of State Parks is responsible for developing, maintaining and preserving the public lands it administers for the purpose of promoting healthful outdoor recreation and education.

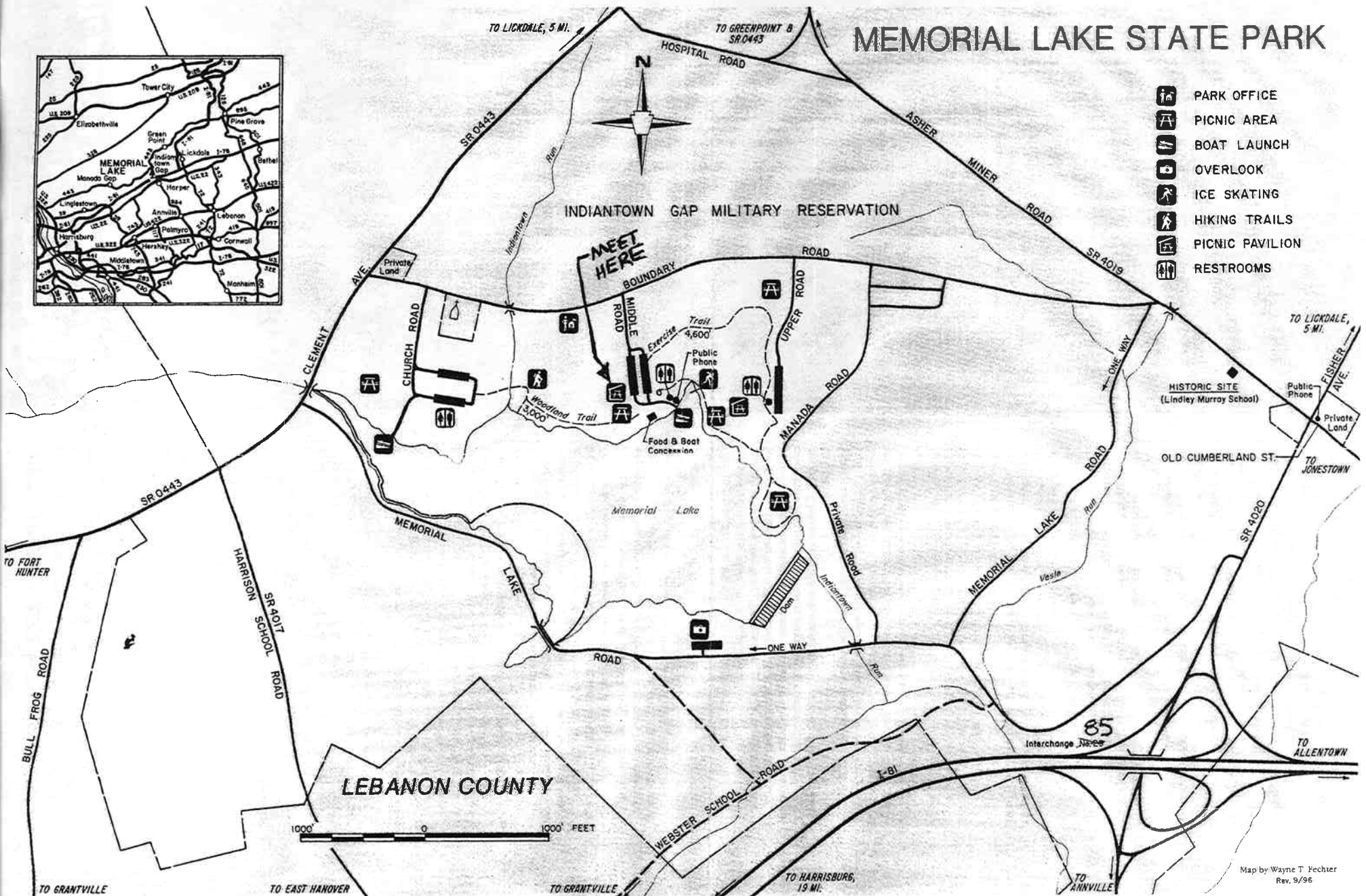
Please make your visit safe and enjoyable by following posted rules and regulations. Park in designated areas and obey all speed limits.

All Pennsylvania state parks have instituted a recycling and waste reduction program. We urge all park visitors to join us in the recycling effort. During your stay, please use the recycling area located in the middle parking lot.

Outdoor recreational activity shall be restricted to locations where physical improvements or posting designates the appropriate purpose and use. Similarly, fires and the disposal of hot coals are permitted only in provided facilities. Trash and all other litter shall be placed in containers provided for this purpose and shall be limited to litter accumulated during the use of state recreation areas.

Natural areas may possess hazards not normally encountered. You are responsible for your family's safety. Parks are for people. Enjoy them year-round!

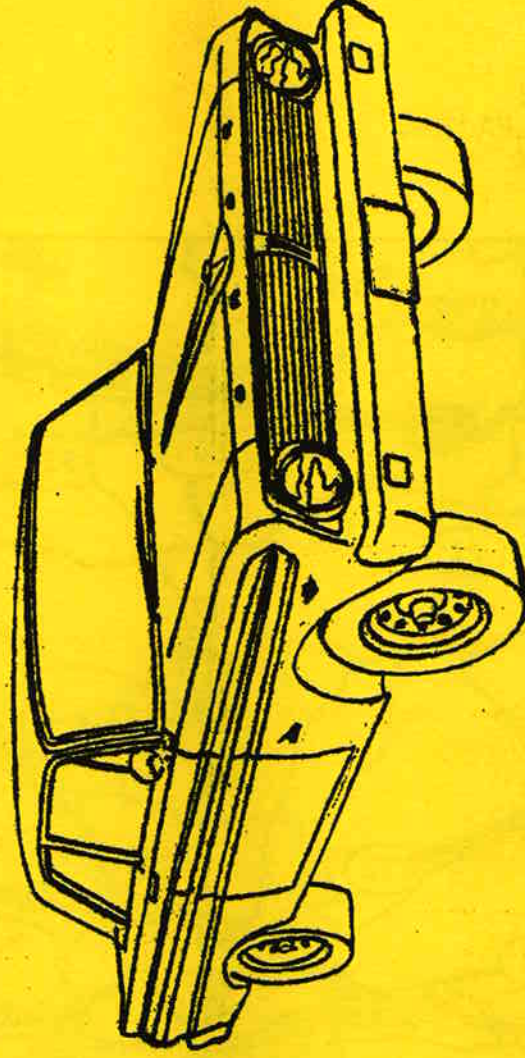

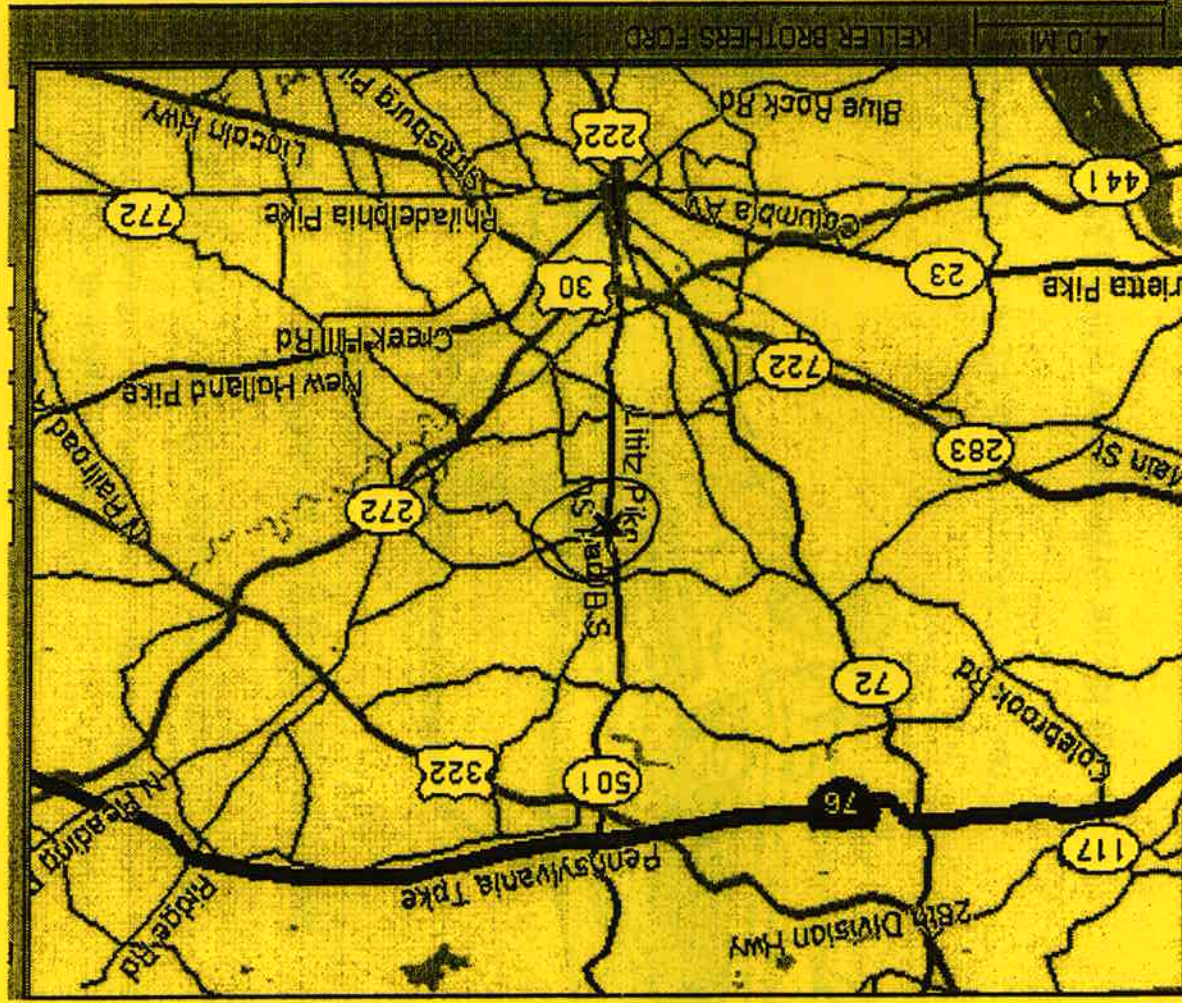
